The series is designed to build capacity for teaching skills that are critical to students developing a deeper understanding of academic content standards.

ACADEMIC STANDARDS: Essential Framework for Developing Information Literacy

Ohio's standards provide a framework for teaching information literacy as an integrated process, embedded in academic content standards. Students learn to manage their own learning and increase recall of the academic content at the same time. Workshop attendees will explore these critical links across all content areas and all grade levels.

INFORMATION LITERACY: Key to Unlocking the Power of Academic Standards

Complex analytical skills are as necessary for 21st Century students as the basic skills of reading, writing and mathematics. Technological advances bring unprecedented volumes of information to student desktops, but how aware are they of how to use it and how to communicate their understanding to others? Ohio's content standards, technology standards and library guidelines all address information literacy skills as the key to bringing it all together and engaging students in deeper thinking.
